## Walking and Wheeling Tool-Kit

Safe Routes to School (SRTS) is a national program that encourages children to bicycle and walk to school every day by making it convenient, fun, and safe.

The IPC has been working diligently on the development of SRTS materials for schools, parents, students, and communities. In August, these materials, along with information on applying for a Safe Routes to School grant, were packaged in a Walking and Wheeling tool-kit and distributed to over 1200 schools across the state. ## Graduated Driver Licensing Law to Save Arkansas Teen's Lives

A law that went into effect on Friday, July 31, has the potential to save dozens of lives every year by giving teen drivers more time to learn behind the wheel with fewer distractions.

The graduated driver licensing (GDL) law, passed during the 2009 Arkansas legislative session, applies new limits to teen drivers in the state, all aimed at keeping them safer. Arkansas teens are nearly twice as likely to die in car crashes than their peers in other states. In fact, 632 Arkansans between the ages of 14 and 19 were killed in motor vehicle crashes between 1999 and 2005, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The new GDL law aims to change these statistics.

The GDL law will require that all teens refrain from using cell phones and other interactive wireless communication devices while they are driving. Texting and talking on the phone have shown to be tremendous distractions that take teens' eyes off the road and draw their minds away from the serious task at hand.

Teen drivers will also be limited in the number of passengers they can carry before they turn 18, since crash risk increases with the number of passengers in the car.

In addition, the new GDL also restricts the nighttime hours during which teens can drive. Those with hardship and intermediate licenses will not be able to drive between 11 p.m. and 4 a.m. unless they are accompanied by a licensed adult over 21 years of age, driving to or from school and church activities, or traveling to or from a job.
